1 "Toyota Commemorative Museum of Industry and Technology" bus stop

1 Toyota Commemorative Museum of Industry and Technology

A participatory museum established by the Toyota Group. The museum is housed in a red-brick factory from the Taisho Period (1912 to 1926) that remains at the birthplace of the Toyota Group. The museum features many textile machines and Toyota's very first passenger car. You could "see", "surprise", "learn" through the dynamic exhibitions and diverse demonstrations, and enjoy with the entire family.

2 "Noritake Garden" bus stop

2 Noritake Garden

Visit the Craft Center to learn about ceramics-making processes and draw your own design on pottery, view Old Noritake products and design sketches on display at the museum, and enjoy shopping at multiple stores, all on verdant green grounds. When you have a spare moment, we also recommend taking a break at the cafe or restaurant, where you'll be served with Noritake tableware.

3 "Shikemichi" bus stop

3 Shikemichi and Endo shopping street area

Shikemichi is a town of merchants built along the progress of construction of original Nagoya Castle, of which warehouses with thick motor demonstrate what the castle town used to look like at present day. Narrow alleys are lined closely with terrace houses, or the like. People can indulge in the friendly atmosphere of traditional commercial and working-class neighborhoods, which will be very rare experience one can expect at the center of city. Some restaurants and street shops are operating in renovated old buildings. It is a spot ideal for a leisurely town walk.

4 "Nagoya Castle" bus stop

4 Nagoya Castle

Built by Tokugawa Ieyasu, this castle is a symbol of the city and hailed as "the castle makes what Owari-Nagoya makes what she is". Highlights of the castle are its castle tower crowned with golden shachihoko (killer whale) statues, the gorgeous Hommaru Palace and the elegant beauty of gardens throughout four seasons. While many buildings in the castle were burnt down during the Second World War, restoration work of the Palace was completed and opened to the public in 2018.

6 Tokugawaen

This Japanese garden features walkways winding around a central pond symbolizing the ocean. The waterfalls and streams use the differences in elevation to create an enjoyable, dynamic landscape. The park was once a residence of the Owari Tokugawa clan, and the vestiges of the old samurai manor can still be seen in the Kuromon gate at the entrance. Seasonal features of the park include peonies from the beginning to the end of April, irises from the end of May to the middle of June, and the autumn leaves at the end of November.

7 Cultural Path Futaba Museum

The residence of Sada-yakko Kawakami, "Japan's first actress," and Momosuke Fukuzawa, "the king of electric power." This Taisho-era manor built in a semi-European style was called Futaba Palace, and the restored grounds are quite resplendent. In addition to the displays of Sada-yakko's personal effects and literary materials, the stained glass windows in the mail hall are a must-see!

5 "Nagoya Castle East/Shiyakusho (City Hall)" bus stop

5 Nagoya Castle East Shiyakusho (City Hall)

"Main government office of Nagoya City" Construction was completed on September 6, 1933, as a project to commemorate the coronation of Showa Emperor. The exterior design features a modern building crowned with tiled roofs in Japanese style. In harmony with Nagoya Castle, Shachihokos are placed at four corners of double-layered roof on the central clock tower, 53.5 m height. The interior also reflects the design of Hommaru Palace of Nagoya Castle. In 2014, the building was designated as an important cultural property, together with the neighboring main government office building of Aichi Prefecture.

Kinshachi Yokocho - Yoshiniao Zone
(Area around the front-gate of Nagoya Castle)
Chance to indulge in the charm of Nagoya engendered by its history. Place where many shops gather, serving standard and specialized Nagoya cuisines of long established restaurants.

Kinshachi Yokocho - Muneharu Zone
(Area around the east-gate of Nagoya Castle)
Highly motivated rising shops are gathered, from where new food culture of Nagoya is disseminated.

7 The Tokugawa Art Museum, Hosa Library

The Tokugawa Art Museum has permanent exhibits of the tools used by the Owari Tokugawa feudal lords, with a focus on the belongings of Tokugawa Ieyasu. Over 10,000 items are housed in the museum, including nine National Treasures, such as the Tale of Genji picture scrolls, and 59 registered Important Cultural Properties, which are exhibited on a rotating basis. The Hosa Library is centered around the Owari Tokugawa clan's former collection of books, housing and displaying approximately 120,000 of Japan and China's old masterworks.

10 Cultural Path Area

The Cultural Path area extends continuously from Nagoya Castle to the Tokugawaen. In this area, historical streetscapes of the Edo, Meiji, Taisho, and Showa periods can still be seen. Visit one of the many stately Taisho-era residences which are now being used as restaurants and are open to the public.

11 Nagoya City Archives

Built in 1922, this former Nagoya district court-house is a brick building in the neo-Baroque style. It has been designated as an Important Japanese Cultural property. It is currently home to the Nagoya City public archives, and government-related documents are stored and displayed here. In addition to detention cells and other displays related to the administration of justice, the stained glass windows near the central staircase are well worth a look.

15 International Design Center NAGOYA (in NADYA Park)

The world of design is introduced widely at the "creators shop Loop" (B1) that sells works of and supports activities by creators, and the Design Gallery (4F) where designers and firms make their presentations. This is a strong point to support the design creation. Just looking at what creators have come up with can be great fun!

16 Nagoya City Science Museum

The exterior design features, a 35-meter-diameter planetarium, the largest in the world, and also, be sure to check out our four large-scale exhibitions featuring an aurora film shown in a -30°C room and a 9 meter tall manmade tornado! These attractions are highly entertaining and allow museum visitors to experience the power of nature. Additionally, the building itself acts as an exhibit through the use of solar power, green walls, visible earthquake-resistant structures and elevator mechanisms.

9 "Nagoya TV Tower" bus stop

12 Nagoya TV Tower

Built in 1954, Nagoya TV Tower is Japan's first TV broadcasting tower. The tower went through overall restoration for the first time since its opening, and reopened in September 2020. In addition to the observatory which is situated 90 m to 100 m above ground level, there are now various locations visitors can enjoy such as a cafe on the 3rd floor where visitors can relax and catch a glimpse of the Sakae cityscape as well as gift stores. After a 66-year history, the tower has been reborn as a new symbol of the city.

13 Oasis 21

Three-dimensional park with function of bus terminal. "Spaceship-AQUA" with a large glass roof offers amazing air walk at 14 m above the ground, and lively events are held almost every week at the "Galaxy platform". There is also a wealth of restaurants and shops to explore, making this quite a literal oasis within the city and a perfect place to take a break. The Spaceship-AQUA, lighted up in the night, has become a popular photogenic spot.

14 Aichi Arts Center

Large cultural complex located at Sakae area of central Nagoya. Features the Aichi Prefectural Museum of Art with a collection of about 8,000 pieces; the Aichi Prefectural Art Theater, made up of three halls: the Main Theater, Concert Hall, and Mini Theater; art spaces for work with lectures, etc.; the Art Library, housing and offering reading materials related to art; and more.

17 Nagoya City Art Museum

This museum is housed in a modern building designed by Kisho Kurokawa, and stands in the middle of Shirakawa Park. The museum's collection of approximately 6,750 works includes those by Modigliani and others of the School of Paris period, as well as Mexican Renaissance works, modern art from Japan and abroad, and works by local artists. The park grounds are decorated with sculptures by famous artists, allowing visitors to encounter art as they stroll through the park.

18 The Electricity Museum

A science museum where visitors can enjoy learning about electricity, energy and the global environment. Have fun experiencing the mysteries of science, creating your own crafts, and participating in experiments. The museum also offers thrilling and exciting experiences such as the Ohm Theater, where you can participate in quizzes and games in which your own face is incorporated into the on-screen display.
