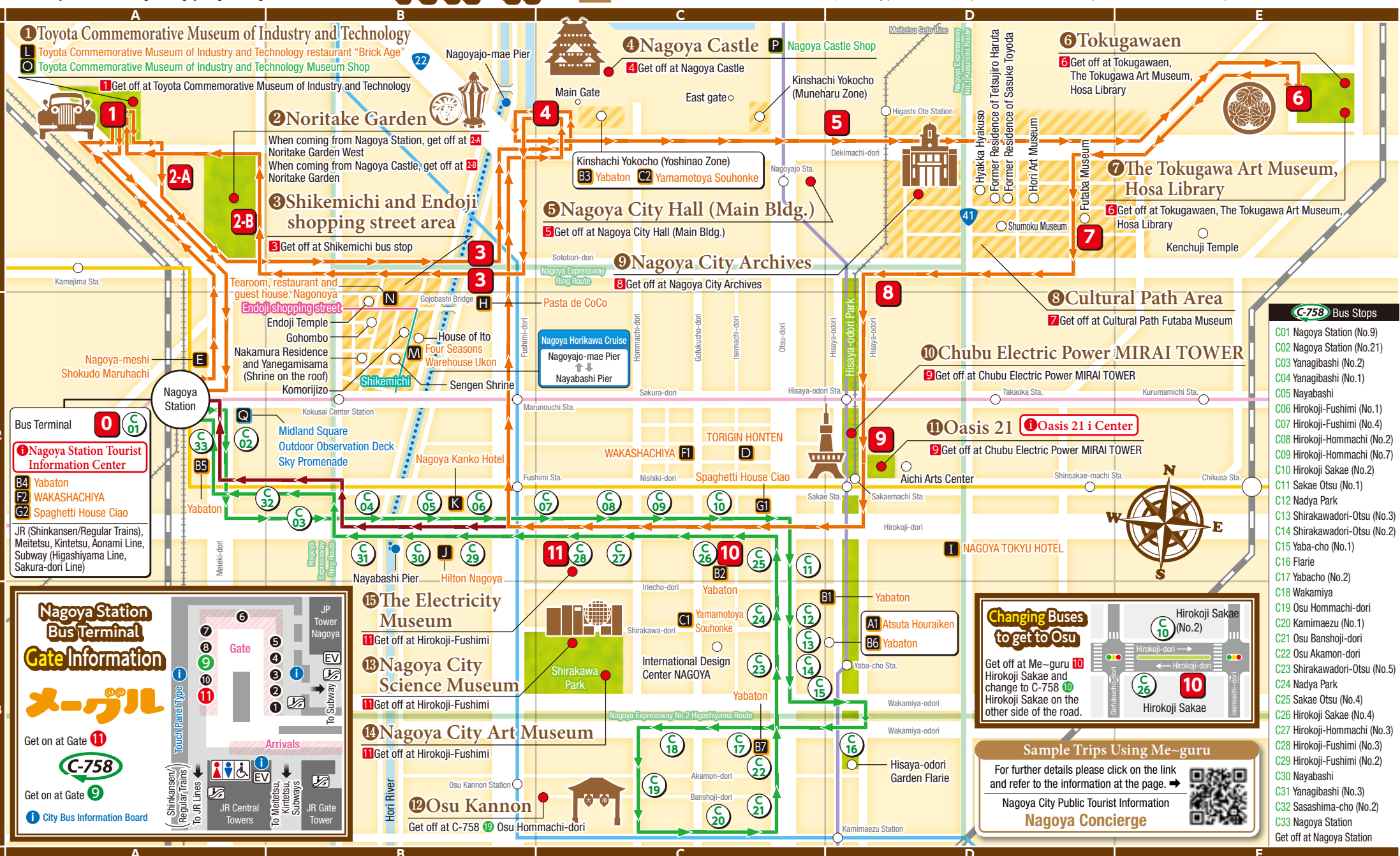

1 Get off at Toyota Commemorative Museum of Industry and Technology MAP ▶ A-1

1 Toyota Commemorative Museum of Industry and Technology

A participatory museum established by the Toyota Group. The museum is housed in a red-brick factory from the Taisho Period (1912 to 1926) that remains at the birthplace of the Toyota Group. The museum features many textile machines and Toyota's very first passenger car. You could "see", "surprise", "learn" through the dynamic exhibitions and diverse demonstrations, and enjoy with the entire family.

2 Noritake Garden

Set within this lush garden you will find various facilities. You can observe the pottery manufacturing process and experience painting on pottery at the Craft Center, see Old Noritake products at the museum. In other places you will find shops, and there is even a cafe and restaurant where serves food with Noritake tableware.

3 Shikemichi and Endo shopping street area

Shikemichi is a town of merchants built along the progress of construction of original Nagoya Castle, of which warehouses with stone wall evokes the appearance of the past castle town. Narrow alleys are lined closely with terrace houses, or the like. You can enjoy the friendly atmosphere of traditional commercial and working-class neighborhoods, which is rare in the center of city. Some restaurants and street shops are operating in renovated old buildings. It is a spot ideal for a leisurely town walk.

4 Nagoya Castle

Built by Tokugawa Ieyasu, this castle is a symbol of the city and hailed as "the castle makes Owari-nagoya what it is". Highlights of the castle are its castle tower crowned with golden shachihoko (killer whale) statues, the gorgeous Honmaru Palace and the elegant beauty of gardens throughout four seasons. While many buildings in the castle were burnt down during the Second World War, restoration work of the Palace was completed and opened to the public in 2018.

*The keep is currently closed to the public.

5 Nagoya City Hall (Main Bldg.)

Complete on September 6, 1933, it was designated as a nationally important cultural property in 2014. The exterior was designed to harmonizing in which Nagoya Castle.

6 Tokugawaen

This Japanese garden features walkways winding around a central pond symbolizing the ocean. The waterfalls and streams use the differences in elevation to create an enjoyable, dynamic landscape. The park was once a residence of the Owari Tokugawa clan, and the vestiges of the old samurai manor can still be seen in the Kuromon gate at the entrance. Seasonal features of the park include peonies from the beginning to the end of April, irises from the end of May to the middle of June, and the autumn leaves at the end of November.

7 The Tokugawa Art Museum, Nagoya City Hosa Library

The Tokugawa Art Museum has permanent exhibits of the tools used by the Owari Tokugawa feudal lords, with a focus on the belongings of Tokugawa Ieyasu. Over 10,000 items are housed in the museum, including nine National Treasures, such as the Tale of Genji picture scrolls, and 59 registered Important Cultural Properties, which are exhibited on a rotating basis. The Hosa Library is centered around the Owari Tokugawa clan's former collection of books, housing and displaying approximately 120,000 of Japan and China's old masterworks.

8 Cultural Path Area

The historical townscape from the Edo to the Showa periods has been preserved in the area from Nagoya Castle to Tokugawaen. Some of them are open to the public.

9 Nagoya City Archives

Build in 1922, this former court building now houses the city archives and is open to the public. In addition to displays of judicial artifacts, such as detention cells, the stained glass in the central staircase is a must-see attraction. This neo-baroque style brick building is one of Japan's important cultural properties.

10 Chubu Electric Power MIRAI TOWER

City's landmark tower built in 1954 as Japan's first consolidated radio tower. It is the first tower in Japan to be designated as an Important Cultural Property of Japan. In addition to the observation decks situated 90 m and 100 m above ground level, the 3rd floor has a cafe where visitors can relax and enjoy the view of the Sakae cityscape and a gift shop that sells original products. Floors 4 and 5 are now a hotel. One of the tower's attractions is the lighting up at night.

11 Oasis 21

Oasis 21 is a 3D park that serves as a bus terminal. The glass roof Spaceship-Aqua where you can take a midair stroll 14m above the ground is popular as photogenic spot.

12 Osu Kannon Temple

The special head temple of the Shingonshu Chisan sect and one of the Japan's three major sacred sites of the Kannon, Goddess of mercy. It also houses a statue of Hotel, one of Nagoya's seven deities of good fortune.

13 Nagoya City Science Museum

Along with the exterior design that features spherical shape of the dome which is the world's largest planetarium, four large-scale exhibits, including an aurora vision in a -30° room and a nine-meter tall man-made tornado are must-see.

14 Nagoya City Art Museum

This modern building in Shirakawa Park was designed by the renowned architect Kisho Kurokawa and houses around 8,100 works including *Ecole de Paris* and *Renacimiento Mexicano*, contemporary art from both within Japan and overseas, and works by local artists.

15 The Electricity Museum

A science museum where you can playfully study the mysteries of science, such as electricity, energy and the global environment, in a relaxed atmosphere.
